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Another Year with Many Challenges for the Rescue



2025 has been very busy for Live and Let Live Farm Rescue. We continue to be inundated with requests to help animals whose owners are ill or are facing financial hardships and can no longer care for them. For example, eight alpacas were surrendered because their owners were too ill to care for them. They came from an alpaca farm in NH. A young Jersey heifer came to the rescue because she could not be bred. She would have otherwise been put down.

We also have pregnant dogs and cats coming nonstop. Unfortunately, this is due primarily to the lack of spay and neuter programs in other parts of the country. In addition, animals are being abandoned, such as the pregnant dog found at a truck stop in Georgia. Another pregnant dog was found wandering the streets in Georgia. Once these animals arrived at LLLF, they received all the care and medical attention they needed and gave birth to their pups usually in foster homes.



We are very grateful to all our volunteers, fosters, Pilots N Paws, Pilots to the Rescue, and donors because it takes a village to continue our mission to give animals a second chance at finding a loving, forever home.

An Animal Rescuer’s Legacy



Seuk Kim was a pilot for Pilots N Paws, a volunteer group of aviators who fly animals, mostly dogs and cats, from various locations around the country, usually high-kill shelters, to areas where these animals have a better chance of getting adopted. Live and Let Live Farm Rescue has been associated with Pilots N Paws for over a year because the rescue believes that all animals deserve a chance to find loving, forever homes.



Whiskey

On November 24, 2024, Seuk was flying three dogs to a Schoharie County facility in Windham, NY, a town in the Catskill Mountains. It was a cold night and there was a lot of snow on the ground when Seuk’s plane encountered turbulence and crashed killing him and Lisa, one of the dogs, upon impact. The other two dogs, Whiskey and Pluto, though injured, survived.



Seuk was passionate about saving animals. He also loved flying. Joining Pilots N Paws allowed him to pursue both, and he often flew multiple flights a week. Teresa Paradis, the executive director of Live and Let Live Farm Rescue, got to know Seuk well because the rescue often received the animals onboard his flights. She said that Seuk loved all animals and whenever he got the opportunity, he would spend time with them and take selfies. Seuk was very humble and unassuming and never looked for recognition. He was happy knowing that he helped animals get a second chance at life.

His fellow pilots, flight coordinators, airport assistants, fosters, and recuses are now known as “Seuk’s Army”. Their foundation, a nonprofit, has purchased a property for fostering and caring for animals until they reach their destination.

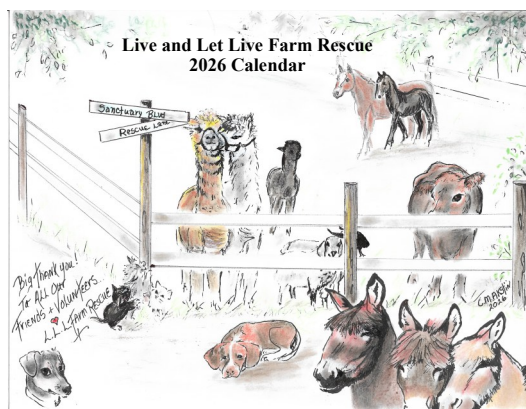
